
Copies of all of the books are available to borrow from the school library. They will be exclusively available to year 8 students during the challenge.

Have you tried ebooks?


As well as the physical books in the school library, Crown Hills students also have access to ebooks in the school elibrary. Ebooks are electronic books which can be read on a smartphone, tablet or computer. They can be accessed from anywhere and at any time.



To get started:

- 1. On your smartphone, computer or tablet at home, download the ePlatform by Wheelers app from the app store of your device or go to the website: https://eplatform.co/uk
- 2. Go to Find Libraries and search for Crown Hills Community College. Select Crown Hills Community College from the results and it will take you to our e-Library.
- 3. Sign in with your Crown Hills username and password this is the same one you use to login to the school computers. You can now browse, borrow and read!

Library Lessons

All students in years 7, 8 and 9 will be coming to the library this term through the Humanities faculty as part of a programme of library lessons intended to promote a whole school reading culture. During these lessons, students will be introduced to books and authors that they might not otherwise have been familiar with across a wide range of genres and styles, both fiction and non-fiction, on themes relevant to the topics being studied this year in Humanities.

In addition, students in years 7 and 8 have visited the library during their English lessons to familiarise themselves with the Accelerated Reader system and what they need to do to complete their half-termly reading homework.

Students were given an opportunity at the end of each library lesson to browse the library shelves and to borrow books. It was wonderful to see how many students took advantage of this opportunity, many borrowing books featured in the lessons, as well as exploring others upon the shelves.





National Poetry Day

National Poetry Day is the annual mass celebration on the first Thursday of October that encourages everyone to make, experience and share poetry with family and friends in order to encourage a love of language and celebrate poetry's power to bring people together.

At CHCC, we held a Poetry Reading Challenge in the library at lunchtime on Thursday 3rd October 2024. This was open to students from all year groups.

Many chose to perform one of our selected poems which fitted in with the theme as announced by the National Poetry Day organisers; this year, this was Counting, and poems included 'Numbers' by Mary Cornish, 'The Square Root of Three' by David Feinberg, 'Ratios' by Dean Martin, and 'Total' by Anna Gilmore Heezen.

Some of our students, however, recited poems which they had written themselves.

All of the students did really well and are to be applauded for their hard work, enthusiasm and courage in standing up before an audience to speak out loud, something which not everyone finds easy. They have all received merits for their efforts.



Carnegie Shadowing Scheme 2024

At the end of the last school year, year 9 and 10 students participating in the Carnegie Shadowing Scheme got together to debate which of the seven shortlisted books to vote for. Their favourite was 'The Boy Lost in the Maze' by former Children's Laureate Joseph Coelho, a verse novel which portrays a coming-of-age story blending the Greek legend of the Minotaur with the guest of a modern-day teenager to find his biological father.


Their vote was combined with those from students at other participating schools around the country to determine the Shadowers Choice for 2024.

The 2024 medal winners were:


Judges Choice: 'The Boy Lost in the Maze' by Joseph Coelho




Murder on a Summer Break – Kate Weston

Marple – Agatha Christie and other authors

Miss Marple made her first appearance in a full-length novel in 1930's The Murder at the Vicarage. It has been over 45 years since Agatha Christie's last Marple novel, Sleeping Murder, was published posthumously in 1976, and this collection of ingenious new stories by twelve Christie devotees – all bestselling authors in their own right – reimagines a character who remains the most famous fictional female detective of all time.
