Mr Adam, Headteacher at Crown Hills Community College has been announced as the gold winner of the Award for Headteacher of the Year in a Secondary School in the 2023 Pearson National Teaching Awards on BBC's The One Show. Mr Adam has been recognised for his unwavering commitment to his students and the wider school community in Leicester.

Mr Adam was nominated and selected as the gold award winner from thousands of nominees based on his inspirational teaching, contributions to his school and community, and influence among colleagues, as assessed by a panel of prestigious judges.

The exciting news was broken to Mr Adam during a school fencing match - a sport which he introduced to the college. Mr Adam was blown away to discover that one of the fencers wasn't a student but rather 'The One Show' host Matt Allwright!

Since taking the helm in 2017, Mr Adam has kindled a love of learning among the 1,500 students at the inner-city college. His values-driven leadership transformed the school into a beacon of opportunity, where attainment and aspiration are central to the students' learning and life experiences. He has made it his mission to change the lives and extend opportunities for everyone in the school community, living the school's motto of 'aspiration, commitment, success'.

During a week-long celebration (20-24 November) honouring inspirational educators across the country, BBC's The One Show announced seven of 16 the gold award winners of the Pearson National Teaching Awards to shine a light on their amazing achievements.

A message from Mr Adam

To my family, my community of parents, carers, colleagues, governors, friends and students (both past and present),

I still can't quite believe what has just happened and I have thought long and hard about the publicity around this award as I do not like to be at the centre of things, especially when others are more deserving than myself but the only reason that I have decided to stand up and be present is because of all of you, especially all of the students that I have taught in the past in all of the schools that I have taught in and for the ones that I am responsible for now.

I have always wanted to teach in communities that are seen to be the underdog, in communities where to look like me, my colour, my faith and my background are seen as a disadvantage. It is in these communities that I wanted to bring about hope and belief; hope for a better future and belief in yourself and your ability, that you can be the best that you can be with a little bit of help and guidance. These are two things that this community needs and deserves. You need to know that if someone like me can achieve this, then so can anyone.

I live seven minutes' walk from this school and have done so for over 40 years, I have grown up with some of your friends, your family, some of you are my family and I do my shopping in the same shops as you, walk the same streets and some of you are my neighbours. My parents were not born in this country, my Dad left Zimbabwe to avoid fighting in the war and came here at the age of 18. My Mum did the same for the sake of an education and a better future. I remember my parents struggling to afford a pint of milk and having to sew patches into my clothes because we couldn't afford new ones. My Mum understood however, the importance of an education, not feeling sorry for myself, taking control of my own future and not leaving it for others to decide.

Whatever your starting place, I am proof that anything is possible. To have been nominated and then selected as the gold winner across England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland is an honour beyond my wildest dreams but again, you need to gain hope and belief that anyone of you can be whatever you want to in life. If I can be recognised, then so can you.

As my students you know how much we talk about commitment being important and doing what it takes for as long as it takes, I can tell you once you understand that, the world is yours. Hard work is the most important thing you can take away from our school. This award equally shines a light on all of my staff, parents and students and the incredible dedication that they show on a day-to-day basis, without them I am nothing.

We have been seen to be the 'poor' school that cannot do as well as those in the wealthier parts of the city, county and country but both this award and the silver award for making a difference, show the rest of the world that we are more than just statistics. The parents here have ambition and a desire to help their children to be the best that they can be and with the support of our college community we hope they can be realised.

To every supporter of our school community, you deserve this! Wherever you are sat reading this, be proud of what you have achieved and be proud of the school to which you are attached to because we have achieved something today that many will not achieve in a lifetime.

I cannot thank you enough but you deserve every bit of the recognition that you receive and I am extremely privileged to be responsible for a college community that really does make a difference!

Thev asked questions like "What is your favourite part of the job?" or "What is the of graphic best part design?" The answers gave them a real insight into those professions.




LONDON SUSTAINABILITY CONFERENCE




